



Surrey Hills – our anniversary year



What an amazing year we have enjoyed celebrating our 10th anniversary, and as we go to print there are still four months remaining!

The year kicked off at Denbies' Wine Estate where our Society had been launched, as a legacy of the 50th anniversary of the Surrey Hills designation as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB); only this time it was for a private viewing of the winning photos of Surrey Life magazine's celebration calendar themed on the Surrey Hills.

Whilst we are just ten years old and the AONB is celebrating 60 years, 2018 also marks 40 years since the North Downs Way (NDW) became a National Trail. We were delighted to join forces with Peter Morris, the NDW Manager, to deliver a series of commemorative walks. Working with key walking festival



organisers across the County, we created several events through stunning scenery along the Trail.

Our chairman Chris Howard's extensive knowledge of walking in the Surrey Hills led to the publication of *Walks for All Ages in Surrey*, launched on 26th June by Dame Penelope Keith at the SHS's and AONB's joint celebrations at Loseley Park, home of Michael More-Molyneux, Surrey's Lord Lieutenant. The evening's festivities took place in the Tithe Barn, where we showcased a wide range of our projects along with the activities of some of our partner organisations to around 130 guests, including members Mr and Mrs Gunnar Nyman, who travelled from Sweden to join us.

Exhibits included two Heritage Lottery Funded projects; the Tales of the Tillingbourne, and *Our Changing Landscape*, written to mark the anniversaries by our Vice Chairman, Ken Bare. Other exhibitors included Surrey Wildlife Trust, GASP Motor Project and local artist Louise Dunkley's vintage style posters. Playle & Partners LLP sponsored the reception which closed with a well received recital by Reed Maxfield with songs about the Surrey Hills.

Another memorable event was hosted by The Rt Hon John Bercow MP in the State Rooms at Speaker's House, Westminster



on 8th May to commemorate the AONB's 60th anniversary. Guests included a number of VIPs from government as well as strong representation from the Surrey Hills. The Kier Group sponsored the reception where a celebration cake was cut and individual cup cakes bearing the AONB logo were served to guests.

The Gatton Park Country Fair, which took place on a scorching July day in the stunning surroundings of Gatton Park, marked our celebrations in the east of the county. Our particular thanks go to Stella Cantor, our Membership Secretary and Trustee who co-ordinated the day, along with the hard-working group of volunteers.

How wonderful that after just ten years, we have the volunteers, network and resources to make all these events happen.

All aboard for the Surrey Hills!

A travel campaign has been launched to encourage visiting the Surrey Hills by public transport. A series of vintage style posters of iconic sites in the Surrey Hills are featuring across railway and bus stations throughout the south east.

The campaign focuses on six of the special locations in the area; Frensham Great Pond, the Devil's Punch Bowl, Newlands Corner, Leith Hill, Box Hill and Reigate Hill

with ideas for things to do in the area, walk options and refreshment stops.

Metrobus, who have embraced the campaign, have gone one step further by producing the artwork in large scale and adorning the back of two double decker buses which will be seen around the East Surrey area.

Local artist Louise Dunckley, who created the posters, comments "A little while ago I began to revisit the old railway posters from the 1930s, and felt it was a style I'd love to try and recreate. I grew up in the Surrey Hills and it's been wonderful to create these posters in honour of 60 years of the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty".



Cycle Surrey Hills launches

The Rt Hon Jeremy Hunt MP helped launch a new network of over 80km of off-road



cycling trails in South West Surrey, funded by a grant from the London Marathon Charitable Trust. The project known as 'Cycle Surrey Hills' aims to encourage residents and visitors to get active, improve fitness and experience the spectacular scenery of the Surrey Hills AONB.

Cycle Surrey Hills is formed of five interlinking routes giving cyclists the opportunity to choose either a long distance ride or shorter loops. The Frensham, Devil's Punchbowl, Thursley, Puttenham and Elstead loops all

offer a challenging ride of varying lengths with breathtaking Surrey Hills views and points of interest along the way. The new trails are the first phase in what is hoped will become an extensive network spreading out across the entire Surrey Hills, giving cyclists the opportunity to experience a long distance route across Surrey.

Look what's come to Farnham Heath...

Why not head out onto Farnham Heath Nature Reserve and discover 'Heathland Artworks'. Twelve temporary works have been made by local emerging artists studying Craft, Product Design and Textiles at the University for the Creative Arts in Farnham as part of a project called Heathland Artworks. The project runs until the 28th October and is free of charge.

All of the artworks are inspired by the heath and its wildlife and can be found amongst the trees and at the breathtaking



viewpoints. Discover interactive kaleidoscopes, ceramic wheels displaying the native birds, printed woven textiles and more... Heathland Artworks is a Surrey Hills Arts project and provides a new way to view and learn about the heath.

Mike Coates, RSPB Ranger, Farnham Heath comments; "Our reserve at Farnham Heath is great for wildlife, but it's also a place for people to visit. This temporary exhibition will add a new element to the site, and hopefully attract a new audience to enjoy it".

Our members may be interested in the element entitled Harvest, to be displayed from dusk until 11pm on 15,16, 22, 23, 29th September,

which has had financial support from SHS. Mary Branson's installation highlights the processes and rituals of harvest time with a focus on the endangered Straw Belle moth. The light installation will be visible from Salomon's Memorial, enabling viewers to see the work from a distance and also at

closer proximity by guided night time walks.

The piece will culminate in a celebration event at the Box Hill viewpoint on the 29th September. This will be an opportunity to find out more about the installation, listen to choirs and poetry inspired by the landscape and more.







New short walks book for Surrey

Last year our Chairman, Chris Howard, was approached by Bradwell Books, the creators of "Walks For All Ages", to write a new book on short walks that showcased Surrey.

Chris Gilbert from Bradwell Books said, "We have created walk books on most counties in England, Surrey was one of the exceptions. We had noticed the Surrey Hills Society walks created by Chris, via the walks pages in Surrey Life magazine. Like all the Walks For All Ages books in the series, they are easy, short, have an interesting story to tell and finish with a pub or café.....and of course they must be free for all to access. We were delighted when Chris agreed to put together this new book for Surrey".

The book features many of the walks created by Chris and other volunteers for the Surrey Hills. Several walks originally developed for the Tales of the Tillingbourne Project have been included. These walks were created by a team led by Dr Anne Sassin, and which included Pete Lambert, Jeff Holliday, Steve Peacock, Chris Howard, Eric Brough and Alan Midgley. Society member, Diane Cooper, who also works for the Countryside Team at Surrey County Council, assisted with walks and photos for the book too.

Chris Howard was delighted when Dame Penelope Keith DL, actress and great charity supporter, agreed to launch the book as



part of the Surrey Hills AONB 60th Anniversary celebrations at Loseley Park on 26th June.

Chris donated her fee for creating the book to the Surrey Hills Society. All proceeds from books purchased from our website will also go to the charity. The book costs £5.99 plus £2.00 P&P or can be purchased at one of our events.

Sponsors view - The only way is up!

We have enjoyed a whole range of festivities this year, celebrating the 10th Anniversary of our Society.

I agreed to write an article this time on the theme "The only way is up!" Of course, that would be an appropriate title for a positive look at the future of the Surrey Hills Society, but I take that projection as a given.


What instead I wish to focus on is the way that our towns and villages are being extended upwards as an alternative to building new homes in the Green Belt. Recent analysis of the demise of the High Street shows that a possible panacea is the creation of new housing above commercial properties.

Many of these developments involve superstructures on existing shops. Some, but not all of these, have been completed in a tasteful fashion.

For businesses like mine, this is a worrying trend, as many of these new homes are taking the place of existing offices and commercial premises. Whilst weekend trade may benefit as a result, with most people having to commute to London in order to afford these properties, many local businesses rely on offices and commercial enterprises to provide them with custom during the week, such as lunch time food, office supplies and services.

We need to find a balance, with more redundant shops being allowed to convert to office use and perhaps even to be converted into new multi-storey office blocks. Local commerce should not be left out either, as a strong community needs local skilled job vacancies for local people to fill.

Planning views

In July, The Government published its new National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) following earlier public consultation to which the Surrey Hills AONB Board submitted its views. For the Surrey Hills it is now an improvement and the most important sentence reads "Great weight should be given to conserving and enhancing landscape and scenic beauty in National Parks, the Broads and AONBs, which have the highest status of protection in relation to these issues". Significantly, the words "and enhancing" have been added to this sentence that were not in the previous NPPF.

Also added is this welcome sentence: "The

scale and extent of development within these designated areas should be limited". However, "limited" is not defined. The Government is also looking for better design.

The NPPF also reinforces the Government's commitment to protecting Green Belts, but other parts of the NPPF emphasise the need for substantially more homes to be built. To this end the new NPPF continues to allow Councils, in their local plans, to allocate housing development on Green Belt sites where it is justified as a very special circumstance to meet local housing needs. The Waverley and Guildford Local Plans have done just that.

To its credit though, Guildford Borough Council has avoided allocating in their Local Plan any housing sites in the AONB and Area of Great Landscape Value (AGLV). However, the Council may have to allocate housing on a few AGLV sites if it accepts the Inspector's requirement for even more housing to be provided.

The Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) have made a legal challenge to the increased housing development now in the Waverley Local Plan. This arises from the Inspector's requirement for the Plan to take half Woking's unmet housing needs not provided for in their own Local Plan. A judge has recently agreed to the CPRE's legal challenge proceeding to the High Court in October.

It is set to showcase and demonstrate the different types of activities that people of all ages and fitness can get involved with - from walking and running to horse riding and cycling, as well as showing how the area is accessible for all.






