The Glover Review of Designated Landscapes

AONB Boundary Review

- **2007** Government agreed to save AGLV policies until Surrey Hills AONB boundary had been reviewed
- **2008** Surrey Hills AONB Board stressed to Natural England and Ministers urgency of the boundary review
- 2012 Natural England includes Surrey Hills boundary review as one of two reviews in its 2012-2018 work programme and for Surrey Hills to follow Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB boundary review
- **2014** Natural England agree to begin work on Boundary Review.
- 2015 2018 each year AONB Board chases Natural England to commence review
- **2018** Natural England indicates it cannot progress boundary review because of work on Glover report
- February 2020 onwards AONB Board Chair starts lobbying Natural England, Defra, constituent Councils and MPs
- October 2020 6 Surrey MPs write to George Eustice Secretary of State for Defra

I hank you for your letter of 22 October to the Secretary of State with a number of cosignatories about the status of the boundary review of the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). I am replying as the Minister responsible for protected landscapes policy and apologise for the delay in doing so. Defra is currently dealing with high volumes of correspondence due to COVID-19. Thank you for your understanding during this challenging time.

We remain committed to ensuring that landscapes such as the Surrey Hills AONB are recognised for their beauty, that they flourish as havens for nature and that they provide a valuable opportunity for visitors to experience inspiration, adventure and relaxation. The Government announced on 18 November a 'Ten Point Plan for a Green Industrial Revolution' which includes assurances to start the process for the creation of new National Parks and AONBs in 2021.

As you may be aware, the statutory responsibility for appraising new or extended National Parks or AONB designations is held with the independent statutory authority, Natural England. I can confirm that Natural England will take forward the development of a programme of designation priorities in the coming year and this will include the consideration of the Surrey Hills extension.

I also understand that members of the Surrey Hills AONB and other local partners are in discussions with Natural England to review and streamline the designation process as recommended by Julian Glover in the Landscapes Review, published in September 2019. This support is invaluable as the suggested improvements to the designation process will inform the future programme of designations.

Thank you for making me aware of the breadth of support for this designation.

Into the Wild Report by Genevieve Lebus The Biophilia Hypothesis

- The **brain evolved** in a **biocentric world**, not a machine regulated world
- We are **predisposed** to **positively respond to nature**, which leads to benefits in health and wellbeing
- Our Natural Health Service

Into the Wild – A summary Mental Health in Surrey

- 10,600 children aged 5-15 in Surrey have a mental health problem.
 - Mainly anxiety
 - There is significant Social inequality
- 70% don't receive help young enough
- 0.74% NHS budget spent on child mental health
- Less contact with nature in childhood is associated with up to a 55% higher chance of developing psychiatric disorders later in life

Into the Wild Identified Barriers

- Accessibility restraints transport
 - Areas of deprivation have less local green space and travel costs are high
 - Disabilities
- Technology and social media
- Parent perceptions and fears
- Social norms and lack of awareness
- Initiatives must be done "with" young people, not "to" them
- Ethnic minorities
 - "White British" identity "People turn around and look at me"

Into the Wild Transforming Lives and Habitats

- Engage a Project Director
- Concentrate on conservation projects with Butterfly Conservation – 13 sites
- Promote therapeutic activities Forest bathing, therapy gardens, outdoor adventure
- Develop pilots working with identified partners
- Social prescribing Surrey Heartlands

- April 2019- March 2020
 - 54 Events
 - 5000 volunteer hours
 - 8 talks
 - 11 shows and external events
 - £28,000 raised through membership fees, talks and donations
- March 2020 to date
 - 23 Events since the end of the first lockdown
 - 515 memberships, of which 213 are family memberships (so at least two people)



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
